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Introduction

Brewarrina Shire Council (BSC) has made an increased commitment to its community service obligations through the identification of its community service's needs, as expressed in the *Community Strategic Plan*.

This *Community Safety & Crime Prevention Action Plan* shows a further commitment, by Council, to assist in developing a safer and more liveable community environment for residents in the Shire.

The *Community Safety & Crime Prevention Action Plan* is an initiative of Brewarrina Shire Council's Community Development Team.

The focus of the plan is the development of a comprehensive and strategic *Crime Prevention Strategic Plan* which has broad stakeholder input and represents an integrated and long term approach to community safety and crime prevention in Brewarrina Shire.

This Action Plan represents a commitment to preliminary work in the area of community safety and crime prevention to raise the profile of this area of work, with a view to taking on a broader, more comprehensive approach in the *Strategic Plan*.

This Action Plan seeks to assist BSC, NSW Police and the local community to determine the present and future needs of the Brewarrina community in this area, in order to develop a greater consciousness of community safety and a decrease in the crime rate in our communities.

Development

This *Action Plan* was developed following an extensive consultation process to inform the development of a *Crime Prevention Strategic Plan*.

Due to limited engagement and input it was determined that a shorter term *Action Plan* would be a more appropriate tool at this stage.

Key activities outlined in this *Action Plan* will hopefully result in greater community and stakeholder engagement to inform longer term planning for the development of a *Strategic Plan*.

A key output of this *Action Plan* will be the development of a *Crime Prevention Strategic Plan* for Brewarrina.

Brewarrina Crime Profile

Data from the *NSW Bureau of Crime Statistics and Research* shows that the top 10 offences committed in Brewarrina Local Government Area (LGA) in 2012 were:

• Assault - domestic violence related
• Assault - non-domestic violence related
• Malicious damage to property
• Break and enter dwelling
• Breach bail conditions
• Steal from motor vehicle
• Harassment, threatening behaviour and private nuisance
• Breach Apprehended Violence Order
• Liquor offences
• Break and enter non-dwelling

Table 2 shows the full range of offences committed in Brewarrina LGA, including the number of recorded incidents and 24 and 60 month trends.

As can be seen from the data presented in table 2, there has only been a significant reduction in one type of offence over the 24 or 60 month period, meaning that crime rates are not reducing in Brewarrina.

This trend and incident reporting data has been used to select focus areas for the *Community Safety & Crime Prevention Action Plan*.
